

History of the Athletic Round Table

hirty four years ago, Jerry Harwin and Caesar Uyesaka sipped coffee at Caesar's Restaurant, talking about the need for a sports group in Santa Barbara that could help the local athletic community in times of need. After Jerry and Caesar shared a couple more coffee breaks together, the Santa Barbara Athletic Round Table was born. Its motto: The advancement and betterment of all sports and athletics in the greater Santa Barbara area.

The Round Table got off to a fast start. Its first organizational meeting was held at Santa Barbara's East Beach on January 25, 1968. Hundreds of people attended this meeting and over 200 joined that evening as Charter Members.

The Round Table's first annual banquet was held at Santa Barbara City College on June 22, 1968. A number of outstanding athletes in a variety of sports were honored; the evening's highlight was the induction of local athletes into the Round Table's Hall of Fame.

Harry's Plaza Cafe was the site of the Round Table's first press luncheon held on September 14, 1970. The luncheons, initiated by the new-president, Bill Bertka, were similar to a "Monday Morning Quarterback Club." All nine area schools were represented by the head coaches of the sport in season. For 31 years, the Round Table luncheons have been held at Harry's every Monday, attended by standing-room only crowds.

Since its first meeting back in 1968, the Santa Barbara Athletic Round Table has helped hundreds of individuals and organizations by raising funds to support their athletic programs. Through membership dues, contributions, fund-raisers, and grant applications, the Round Table has raised more than \$1,800,000!

Funds are distributed according to need. The Round Table is proud to help student-athletes at all levels compete in events they would otherwise not have been able to attend. With continued community support, we at the Round Table are confident that Santa Barbara's sports opportunities will continue to grow with each new season.

Russ Hargreaves Memorial Award





She is proud to state that her supervisor, during her entire career, has been former Hargreaves Award recipient Cliff Lambert.

Of Brown Lambert says: "A true trailblazer forging ahead and making a difference in the lives of our community youth. Theresa Frazier Brown is a recreational professional whose time has come to be recognized for extraordinary leadership, service and broad based support ..." And tonight Terry is being recognized as the recipient of the prestigious Hargreaves Award, a very special award for those who serve our youngest.

In three short years, Terry's efforts have been rewarded by the tremendous enthusiasm for her work on the After-School Opportunities for Kids program. The A-OK! recreation program is found at all ten SB elementary school sites and serves over 800 children per day. Additionally she has introduced and maintained summer camps, a counseling program by teens, a girls fast-pitch program, the partnered Healthy Start Leadership Team and science camps; she has established excellent rapport with schools and agencies.

She says of her service: "Committed to collaborative efforts toward implementation of programs that enhance the opportunity for all youth in the Santa Barbara community to succeed." And she still has time for husband Peter, and children Kyle and Courtney.

Louise Lowry Davis Award

Louise Lowry Davis was Supervisor of the S.B. Recreation Dept. for over 30 years before retirement in 1966. As director of the Women's Sports League, she made women's sports activities one of the biggest draws in town in the 1930's and 1940's. Louise was a State Champion and nationally ranked in 1936 and 1939 in table tennis. Over the years, Louise has generously contributed to the youth of Santa Barbara. This award is given to a person recognized as a player, coach or sponsor who excels in leadership and sportsmanship.

News-Press sportswriter John Zant made one of the few errors in his career; he asked Louise Lowry Davis: "How old are you?"

She answered: "People can get shot for asking me that question. Age has nothing to do with anything. That's a negative thought that drags people down. I'll never tell my age. The hell with it. I don't know any old people. We're all alive and kicking."

See that table up in front with all the ladies? They're here every year. Banquet stars. Don't ask them how old they are, they are disciples of Louise Lowry Davis and members of the Santa Barbara 7-Up softball team. And if you tried to turn a double-play against them you'd better get out of the way. In 1938 they played in front of 4000-5000 people at Pershing Park – and won. In 1938!

OK - ask, how old are they? You figure it out. Slugger Angie Giovanacci Campitelli is the "kid" – she just turned 80. Why the kid? Because she fibbed about her age to be able to play before she graduated from SBHS. And what interviews. We called catcher Adeline Taverna Tomberg. OK if she called back in ten? Sure, you know, waning memories and all. Sure, waning memories.

When she did call back she had sister-in-law and team captain Ida Duncan Taverna on a three-way conference call. They spoke of batting averages, cities visited, positions, coaches, correct name spellings, visiting teams, coaches, like it was – well, 63 years ago! And be sure to spell Coach Timmy Badillo with an "o." Poor things.

But they're not being honored because they won. They're being honored because they are still winning. And so are the young women and girls who can look up to them as role models. They established and are epitomizing the standards and values which we are just now beginning to understand. Every year they attend the Round Table Luncheon on 'Women and Girls in Sports Day' and say: "Hey, look, come on, let's go!" What an appropriate award.


And if you want to know how old they are, don't ask John Zant!

There are two things so very special about the Special Olympics: the athletes and the people who work and volunteer on their behalf. Tonight is about the athletes and more significantly, the Special Olympics Athlete of the Year. Those who worked and volunteered in the program, who organized and officiated and who worked so closely with so many of their charges have selected Kyle Petersilia.

He is a highly motivated and intensely respected teammate in the program. One of his coaches said: "Kyle is an outstanding athlete who is always working hard and is a team player. I can think of no better person to receive this award." Another commented: "No one is more willing to work hard and listen than Kyle."

One of the qualities required for selection is that the person demonstrate a long history of competing in a variety of sports. How about track and field, floor hockey, softball, basketball, and soccer? In 1999 he was one of three Santa Barbara athletes selected to represent Southern California in the International Special Olympics Games.

He also participates each year in the Special Olympics Torch Run, a collaborative effort with law enforcement to raise funds for the program. In addition to being a true sports junkie, Kyle assists with San Marcos HS football and with SBCC athletics.

The community of Santa Barbara is very proud of you, Kyle, and thanks you for ten years of outstanding participation. How about ten more?





MICHAEL DEAN




Kristin has maintained a 4.55 GPA in a strong college preparatory curriculum and will attend UCLA in the fall. Her career goal is to become a teacher.




PAMELA "JILL" CLARK


One of his teachers writes: "Kevin is an outgoing, hard-working person of integrity and quality who is highly respected by his teachers and peers alike."

SINCLAIR BILL

It started 46 years ago in Punahou, Oahu. So where is Sinclair Bill as we write this piece? Playing tennis in Australia – and as usual championship tennis.

In 1995, she was the first woman in her age group to ever win on grass, clay, hard court, and indoors play – the Grand Slam. In that same effort she was in the four doubles finals and won two of them. In 1996 she was ranked #1 in both singles and doubles in the USA and #2 singles in the world. In 1998, she was ranked #3 singles and #1 doubles, and in 1999, she was ranked #4 singles and #3 doubles. In 2001, it was #2 USA singles and #1 doubles and #4 singles in the world.

At the ITF World Championships, she won the doubles in 1995, 1996, 2000. Also in 2000 she won the National Hardcourts singles, was a finalist in doubles, won the Grass Courts Doubles, was a finalist in singles, won the indoors doubles, and was a finalist in the singles. As coach of the Girls Tennis Team at SBHS, she has won the Channel league every year (two ties) since 1987. In 1999, she coached the Boys Tennis Team to the Channel League Championship.

From a young girl in Hawaii; to a world champion; to becoming the Master Athlete of the Year. Nice going, Sinc (and family!)







John Osborne Coach

His family says: "Never a dull moment when he's around." "No grass grows under his feet" say his coworkers. And his players? "P.P.P.P.P.," (Prior Planning Prevents Poor Performance.)

And so does great coaching. It is for that quality that he is being inducted by the Round Table. In 31 years as baseball coach at Alan Hancock College, "Ozzie" led his team to a record of 698 wins and 409 losses. The 698 is the third highest total wins in California Community College history. During that period of time his Bulldogs also won eleven conference championships and won the state championship in 1972. Twenty-five times he coached his team to 20 wins or more.

While those are glowing and Hall of Fame level stats, say the name *John Osborne* in the Santa Maria area and in return you will hear respect, quality, class and caring – with a grin and a chuckle tossed in. Few

coaches can attain that level of success with such a great sense of humor, abounding enthusiasm and genuine caring for his players and staff - tempered by intense dedication, high-level expertise and a work ethic worthy of role-modeling.

Testimony to that positive philosophy of athletics is the number of former players and their families with whom he maintains a relationship.

One of the great athletes to have participated in the Santa Barbara community, John played at the highest level of basketball and baseball competition at SBHS, SBCC and UCSB. He followed that with a stint in the Los Angeles Dodgers organization.

But his real major league accomplishments were Elizabeth, Jennifer, Sarah, Jon, Jeff, Doug, Dave, five grandkids and wife Mardi who teaches at Hancock.



Jim Peterson Outstanding Athlete

Think about this. Just how high is 13 feet?

Of course that depends upon the context; if that's tonight then it is twice as high as any one here is tall (including the M.C.)

If you're talking about today's pole vaulting, with high tech flex-poles, composition runways, and large elevated landing pads of absorbent foam, it is a very modest height. But if you're asking about 13 feet in 1937, with dirt runways, bamboo poles, and a sawdust landing pit, that's pretty close to the moon.

But that is exactly what Jim Peterson of Carpinteria High School did, vaulting 13-1 5/8 inches for one of the nation's top marks, a mark he would have probably eclipsed in the CIF Finals except for a technical ruling: he had turned 19 just before the finals and couldn't compete.

There's more, like holding the school record in the

100 yard dash and finishing 2nd in the CIF pole vault as a junior.

Now, think about this: he won 18 varsity letters in 5 sports during his career at Carpinteria High: football, basketball, baseball, and track. Then toss in a couple of tennis letters, and it spells incredible athlete.

Not only did he letter, but became the MVP of the football team and captain of an undefeated basketball team and continued his track career at Pasadena Junior College.

Such an outstanding athlete was Peterson that he was elected to the Helm's Athletic Hall of Fame in 1958, one of the most prestigious awards in high school sports.

However, he was elected posthumously. On December 29, 1944, during WW II's "Battle of the Bulge," Jim Peterson was killed in action.



Kristin Knapp Cole Outstanding Athlete

Kristin Knapp was captain, all-league, all-CIF, all-county, all-state and All-American while playing Basketball at Santa Barbara High School. She was both Channel League and SB County MVP, SBART and News-Press Athlete of the Year, all-time leading rebounder and second leading all-time scorer.

As a scholarship power forward on the NIT and NCAA-bound Notre Dame University, she was named to the MCC all-freshman squad and played in the NCAA three of her four years at ND.


That says a lot about Kristin the basketball player, but not much about the person, the character or her athleticism. She graduated with high honors and remains one of the most dedicated, tenacious, physically and mentally toughest, determined and competitive female athletes SBHS has enjoyed watching. And while playing at an All-American level it was

her team that was all-important, not her personal stats (although they were awesome.) Her work ethic and spirit motivated her teammates.

All of that and Kris still had time to be a bright, pleasant, smiling, engaging and charismatic young lady.

Maybe it was the one-on-one with her dad Larry, former Dons Coach, or all-league brother Jon. Or maybe it was just the tall young girl at Peabody School dribbling, head faking and driving on all-comers. So much so that her 4th grade teacher asked the Kindergarten teacher if she would take Kristin on as an aide. Heck, she was coaching when she was nine.

Whatever the reason – it worked. Kristin is happily married to Trevor Cole. She is presently coaching at UNLV and enjoys reading, traveling and music.



Chris Haake Outstanding Athlete

Chris Haake is an endangered species. He deserves protection. Like an old comedian - George Gobel - said: "You can't hardly get them kind no more."

During his four years at Bishop Garcia Diego High School, Chris played on 12 teams. Do the math, that's three teams per year for four years, all but one at the varsity level. That in itself is enough.

But for four years Chris played football, basketball, and ran track. He didn't just play, he won a wall full of plaques for team MVP, all-league, league MVP, all-CIF, and a passel of track records.

In his freshman year of basketball, Chris was their big man at 6 feet 2 inches. News-Press sportswriter John Zant nicknamed the team the "red ants."

As a soph he was: the second leading receiver; the only sophomore named to the all-league basketball team;


and broke the 880 record. Junior year?: all-league in football; all-league in basketball; and became league 880 champion.

No senioritis here. Chris added all-league in football; league MVP and all-CIF in basketball; and another league track record.

A run with the Oregon Ducks found him stepping with future NFL people like Dan Fouts, Norv Turner, Russ Francis, and June Jones while playing against USC, Nebraska, Notre Dame and Oklahoma.

His future really began with a three year coaching stint with Bishop – until wife Rita, kids Jennifer, Christina and Joseph won him over. He has even had time to serve as an Access Design Engineer for Verizon.

Sam Randolph Jr. Outstanding Athlete

Is there any title in athletics that elicits more instant respect than "professional golfer?" Here's a person who can do those things that scare most of us into apoplexy.

Buried in the sand? No problem, just take a lot of that sand and knock it up there stiff. Little uphill pitch to the green with the pin up close and a downhill slope? Relax, cut it sharp and get it stopped.

Sam Randolph Jr. is one of those guys, a professional golfer of fourteen years, a number that should be higher - he was playing at that level in high school.


While at San Marcos High School, Sam was the State CIF Champion; won the Southern California Jr. Match Play title; was low amateur at the L.A. Open and made the cut; was runner-up at the Jr. PGA Championship; won the Jr. World; and won the Jr.

World Matches (pro/am) with Billy Andrade.

USC liked young Sam, son of longtime La Cumbre Country Club professional, Sam Randolph Sr. They were right. He was a second-team All-American as a freshman and 1st team the next three years. He was runner-up U.S. Amateur in '84 and won 13 tournaments while at USC. He won the US Amateur 1985; was the low amateur at both the 1985 and 1986 Master's and the 1986 US Open.

The success of Sam Randolph Jr. stands as a beacon for young golfers, especially those Royals of SMHS who have long had young Sam to look up to.

Sam and wife Julie now live in Ft. Worth, Texas and when he isn't pitching a golf ball, he's pitching his favorite lures.



Tom Duke Outstanding Athlete

Professional athlete. One who participates in a sport for money, an expert, plays against and is one of the best in the world. Loves the game.

We should have been suspicious of Tom Duke from the beginning. Any tall, lithe young kid who plays basketball, can jump, likes the beach, is competitive and is willing to play volleyball at home, on the beach, and at school has got to be watched.

We shouldn't be surprised (his coach wasn't.) At Dos Pueblo HS he was an all-league basketball player; in volleyball he was all-league and all CIF, right at the top. Something was up with this kid.


Then it started: while at USC he was a three-time all-American and was the National Player of the Year on a National Championship team in his junior year, 1988. During that period he began seriously playing on the beach and became a AAA doubles player. Next

up for the young Duke was twice being named to the USA National Team – in 1990 and 1994.

He had become an accomplished professional. He played for eleven years in 20 different countries, the Spanish Professional League, the Dutch League, French League, the German League, and with the USA in the Asian International 4-man Beach Tour. He became one of those guys who plays games for money, is most expert, competes against the best in the world and loves the game

In the early 90's he played on the prestigious Bud Light professional 4-Man Beach Tour and became the Rookie of the Year and 1992 Tour MVP, winning 13 championship titles.

Those of us involved in athletics appreciate those three letters - *pro*; we save those for the best. That's the ultimate compliment: "He's a real pro!"



Dick Mires Community Leader

Dick Mires is a really sneaky guy. But we'll get back to that. From Tacoma, Washington, to Stanford, then to UCSB where he earned his degree and teaching credential. He has taught at each SBHSD high school and served as P.E. Department Chair, AD, and Head Football Coach at Dos Pueblos – and all with great success.

When he left DP is when he got sneaky. He's been on the Board of Directors for 26 years, served as President and has operated behind the scenes of every Round Table effort-the *go-to guy* you never see. He epitomizes the old adage that says: "It's amazing how much can be accomplished if no one cares who gets the credit."


One of his many contributions, alongside Pat McPhee, has been working with the Hall of Fame. He has served on selection committees, contacted inductees, set up arrangements at the facility, organized speakers and ensured that details were attended to, all without being noticed. Behind the scenes.

Dave Gorrie Coach

Dave Gorrie is perhaps the greatest of two sport athletes in the history of UCSB. Playing fullback and outfield, he has been inducted into the UCSB Hall of Fame in both football and baseball and played professional baseball with the Kansas City organization.

He went on to become Head Baseball Coach at his alma mater and later at Pepperdine University. It is for his accomplishments in those endeavors that he is tonight being inducted into the SBART Hall of Fame. He'll hang that plaque on the wall along with the others: UCSB Football and Baseball; Pepperdine University as a coach; and the American Baseball Coaches Association.


But first, learn a little about the character of Dave Gorrie. His greatest athletic joy? Not being an All-American or a hall of famer, but starting in the same 1950 Gaucho backfield with brothers Dick (QB) and Doug (RB.)

There are few coaches who championed integrity,

moral values, loyalty, and respect for others, more than Dave Gorrie. But that was easy, for those were the same qualities and standards by which he lived and coached.

His proudest achievement? Bringing both UCSB and Pepperdine baseball to a degree of national prominence. Nineteen years at UCSB (including 8 in football,) and 10 years at Pepperdine. In 1972 his conference champion Gauchos lost to USC in the regional finals, and while at Pepperdine his teams went 409-205 in regular season games and 19-13 in regional and World Series games. He won five conference championships and played in five regional finals. While producing many all-Americans and major leaguers, it was the citizenship and moral fiber of his players that mattered most.

Congratulations Dave, wife Linda, son Bryan, daughter LuAnne, and little Cody and Zach. The Gorries now reside in Carthage, Texas.



Mike Hart Coach

Dual meet record from 1972 thru 1992: 268-21. Channel League record: 141-9. In the big world those numbers will get you an agent and big numbers with a \$ sign in front of them.

In the world of high school wrestling, numbers like that will get you the real prizes: a lot of gratification, respect and "Coach of the Year" awards from the Pacific Wrestling Association. They'll bring you three CIF-SS Championships, two seconds, 41 team tournament wins and a California Invitational Tournament championship.

But legendary numbers are not the only measure of success for Mike Hart. His conscientiousness, determination, enthusiasm and exacting nature brought out the best in his young competitors. In perhaps the most demanding of all high school sports, Mike led 90 pounders to super heavyweights to the top of the mountain, reflecting the tenacity and

aggressiveness of their coach. And the caring.

He was a PTSA "Teacher of the Year." He was invited to lead the 1977 SPAAU Cultural Exchange Team to Japan and was appointed to the prestigious CIF-SS Professional Rights and Responsibilities Committee. Not only does his won/loss record stand alone, he was the real motivating force in inaugurating the wrestling program in Santa Barbara. In that effort he credits parents Audrey Welby and Georgiana King for their commitment.

His true-love and support staff? His wife Kathryn, daughters Susan, UCSB '89, and twins Jennifer and Jeanine, who like their father graduated from BYU.

When not teaching history or coaching football and wrestling, Mike will be fishing, mountain biking, trap shooting or taking photos.



Joel Silverman Special Achievement

His biographical sketch says that he is a self-employed real estate investor - Private Equity Group. Sure. C'mon, Joel, you're busted, we know better. You're a pick and shovel guy. You're a gardener, you drive a tractor and you plant sod. Then you irrigate it, fertilize it and mow it.

But before that you had to put on your tie, gather volunteers, raise the necessary funds, run through all the permitting and make deals with the neighbors. Gather up materials for sprinklers, fencing and backstops - then take off your tie, put on your work clothes and get dirty.

I guess in a way that's real estate development, just a different kind.

The kind of development that provides acres of beautiful softball fields for beautiful young girls, especially those playing softball for Dos Pueblos HS (and the community of Goleta.)

So after struggling for two years in the mid-90's the DPHS athletic staff shook the extended hand of Joel Silverman and let him have his rein. In less than two years the Charger girls were playing softball on their own fields at their own school, the Goleta Community Softball Fields at DPHS.

Joel says: "It was pure luck that placed me in a position to head up the effort to build these fields. I seized the opportunity as my chance to repay so many parent volunteers in our community who give of their time so that my kids and others have a chance to participate in sports. It is to these volunteers and their efforts that these fields should be dedicated."
