

In February of 2002, the Round Table, the Boys and Girls Club and the Santa Barbara community at large suffered a great loss with the death of Jane O'Brien.

# History of the Athletic Round Table

hirty five years ago, Jerry Harwin and Caesar Uyesaka sipped coffee at Caesar's Restaurant, talking about the need for a sports group in Santa Barbara that could help the local athletic community in times of need. After Jerry and Caesar shared a couple more coffee breaks together, the Santa Barbara Athletic Round Table was born. Its motto: The advancement and betterment of all sports and athletics in the greater Santa Barbara area.

The Round Table got off to a fast start. Its first organizational meeting was held at Santa Barbara's East Beach on January 25, 1968. Hundreds of people attended this meeting and over 200 joined that evening as Charter Members.

The Round Table's first annual banquet was held at Santa Barbara City College on June 22, 1968. A number of outstanding athletes in a variety of sports were honored; the evening's highlight was the induction of local athletes into the Round Table's Hall of Fame.

Harry's Plaza Cafe was the site of the Round Table's first press luncheon held on September 14, 1970. The luncheons, initiated by the new-president, Bill Bertka, were similar to a "Monday Morning Quarterback Club." All nine area schools were represented by the head coaches of the sport in season. For 32 years, the Round Table luncheons have been held at Harry's every Monday, attended by standing-room only crowds.

Since its first meeting back in 1968, the Santa Barbara Athletic Round Table has helped hundreds of individuals and organizations by raising funds to support their athletic programs. Through membership dues, contributions, fund-raisers and grant applications, the Round Table has raised more than \$1,800,000!

Funds are distributed according to need. The Round Table is proud to help student-athletes at all levels compete in events they would otherwise not have been able to attend. With continued community support, we at the Round Table are confident that Santa Barbara's sports opportunities will continue to grow with each new season.

Students have been selected by principals, senior counselors, athletic directors and coaches at the various high schools and colleges in the Santa Barbara area.



Richard S. Olmstead Special Achievement

Dick Olmstead is called the *Father* of the Tri-County sports officials. Dick and his wife Jackie moved to Carpinteria in 1944. Athletics were an important part of Dick's life, and he began volunteering with Carpinteria's high school football program.

Dick's career with the Pacific Telelphone company lasted thirty seven years. His occupation allowed him to become involved with the city he loved and called home. Whether he volunteered as a lifeguard, a fireman, an ambulance driver, a fundraiser for the Lions Club, a Scout Master or track official for the Russell Cup, he was always professional and prepared.

Dick's passion for officiating turned into a lifelong hobby. For 37 years, Dick could be seen with his trusty whistle, big voice and watchful eye. His fair interpretation of the rules always placed him in the thick of action during Tri-County Chamiponship football and basketball games.

Dick was the consummate professional in his approach to officiating. He was always on time, knew the rules, and believed in fair play and good sportsmanship. In his own words: "The student-athletes and coaches have worked hard all week long for this contest, and I owe it to the athletes and coaches to give them my best effort." Dick mentored a number of local officials who today are officiating major college sporting events. His support, leadership and compassion towards young officials will always be appreciated by his officiating colleagues.

Due to his outstanding service and dedication to inter-scholastic athletics in the Tri-Counties and Southern California, Dick was inducted into the California Interscholastic Federation Hall of Fame in 1986. If the measure of a man's life is that of his deeds, then the distance to describe Richard Olmstead's contributions to Tri-County officials has not yet been discovered.


#### **DEBBIE FOLEY**

With every thriving organization, success can usually be traced back to one individual whose leadership and dedication were instrumental in its quest to achieve excellence. Debbie Foley's dedication and untiring commitment to youth soccer in Santa Barbara were instrumental in regional soccer attaining the level of excellence seen today. Her direction and organization were key in providing the foundation of the American Youth Soccer Organization in the Santa Barbara region.

During Debbie's four years as AYSO Commissioner, she saw the program grow from 1300 to 2500 participants. Under her leadership, the registration process was streamlined, participant databases were computerized, fund-raising goals were established and accomplished and AYSO was moved from 12 playing sites to 1 location at UCSB. Debbie started the first local soccer tournament (now over 200 teams).

Debbie feels that "you meet the best people" when volunteering for youth athletics. She served for three years as the President of the Charger Association at Dos Pueblos and currently serves as the Tournament Director for the Futbol Club of Santa Barbara. She is an active member of the Santa Barbara Area Soccer Coalition. She continues to work on establishing open spaces for youth athletic programs. Her commitment to youth athletics is a family thing, as her husband and children are active in sports and support her advocacy of youth sports. She has helped provide Santa Barbara youth athletes with a safe, positive and nurturing athletic environment. Russ Hargreaves would be proud!

Jim St. Clair Special Achievement

As corny as it may sound, Jim St. Clair is with us in spirit at this 35th annual Hall of Fame Banquet.

When St. Clair got involved in an activity, it became more fun because of his high spirits. He even made Dos Pueblos High's football players eager to practice. "He was always a jolly man, always positive," said Jeff Uyesaka, who was coached by St. Clair. "He helped us have a good time while he taught us how to play the game. With the coaches we had, you looked forward to going out there."

St. Clair was a businessman who donated his time to local sports. He started coaching in the Youth Football League. Before he got involved, he made sure that the emphasis was on the kids' having fun.

When local schools experienced a shortage of coaches, St. Clair helped out at Dos Pueblos. He coached the

Chargers freshman football team and later became a varsity assistant. St. Clair made his mark in Santa Barbara as a football player in the late '50s. He was a record-setting quarterback at UCSB. He then worked as a bowling alley manager and rolled several 300 games.

One of his last gigs was as a volunteer bowling instructor for the blind. He shared the joy with his students at the sound of all the pins falling down.

Iim also faced the cancer that took his life earlier this year with high spirits. He got out of his bed at the Serenity House hospice center and made an appearance at a football practice as the DP Chargers prepared for a CIF playoff game. They gave him an autographed game ball. And with much appreciation, the Round Table gives Jim St. Clair its highest honor tonight.



George Bliss Community Leader

An avid sports fan, successful businessman and tireless community servant, George Bliss has been active in our community helping for over 60 years.

As a resident of Carpinteria since 1921, he has been Chairman of the Memorial Stadium Steering Committee and he championed the funding of the High School's Memorial Stadium. Recently he was selected as the Honorary Directory of the Russell Cup Track Meet. A 60 year member of the Lions, he was instrumental in establishing the Carpinteria Lions Park. He has been active in the campaign to build the city swimming pool and in the establishment of the Historical Museum. There hasn't been a Boys or Girls Club Capital Campaign that did not involve George. He has been on the Carpinteria School Board, a Director of the Chamber of Commerce, and in 1967 was Carpinterian of the Year.

George's good works don't stop in Carpinteria. As President and Director of Elings Park, he played a key role in transforming a useless landfill into a showcase park. He is Past Chair of the SB County Employees Civil Service Commission, Past Chair of the SB Sheriff Civil Service Commission, Past Member of the SB Planning Commission, Past Director of the Land Trust of SB County and Past President and Director of the 19<sup>th</sup> Agricultural District. George is this year's recipient of both the News-Press Lifetime Achievement Award and the Santa Barbara Foundation's Man of the Year Award.

As for athletic prowess, George has that too. In 1935 and 1936, he won the Russell Cup 660. In 1936, he was the State Champion in the 660. He was a member of the UCLA Track Team and the Captain of the UCLA Cross Country Team. However, he is most proud of being a member of the Carpinteria High School Medley Relay Team that beat Clarence Schutte's best back in 1935.


George and his wife Marjorie have 3 children: Terry, Wendy & Tim and 6 grandchildren.

# Louise Lowry Davis Award

Louise Lowry Davis was Supervisor of the S.B. Recreation Dept. for over 30 years before retirement in 1966. Louise was a State Champion and nationally ranked in 1936 and 1939 in table tennis. Over the years, Louise has generously contributed to the youth of Santa Barbara. #### MARK FRENCH

When Mark French graduated from UCSB in 1973, he aspired to be a baseball coach. If you had told him he would return to Santa Barbara 14 years later to coach the Gaucho women's basketball team, he would have thought you were nuts. Women's sports were, at best, a curiosity during his college years. But changes had begun sweeping through intercollegiate athletics, prompted in part by the passage of Title IX in 1972. While many of his peers resisted the movement, French became one of its leaders.

French took a job coaching women's basketball at the University of the Pacific in 1979 because he needed the money. He was also the pitching coach for UOP's baseball team. He'll always remember the first time he watched a women's basketball game – he was one of the coaches. Two years later, French resigned from his baseball position because he felt his women's team deserved his full-time energy and attention.

UCSB had a downtrodden women's basketball program when French began coaching the Gauchos in the 1987-88 season. In his fourth year, they had a winning season. In his fifth, they won their first Big West championship and reached the NCAA Tournament for the first time. They made their seventh appearance in the "Big Dance" this past year, and French passed two milestones with his 300th victory at UCSB and 400th of his career. His team's winning ways boosted the community's following of the Gauchos. Next to Stanford, they have the top drawing women's college basketball team in California. His program has graduated 98 percent of its student-athletes and has produced more Big West scholar-athletes than any other team.


#### CAMILLE NOEL PIRKO

After corrective surgery she was given a clean bill of health, but the surgeon did say she would probably never play sports. He just didn't know Camille! As a baby she loved the ocean and would do anything to get in for a swim. Later she developed a love for playing ball. The fact that she didn't catch well never deterred Camille. She would have lived at Dodger Stadium if it had been an option!

At Devereux, Camille's first Special Olympics sport was swimming, and Saturdays revolved around practicing and participating in meets. Her favorite was the breaststroke and she always participating 100%, even when the pool water was much colder than she would have liked. How proud she was when she had the ribbon pinned on!

After swimming with such success, Camille was got involved in Special Olympics Basketball and Bowling events. A perfect weekend for her was bowling at Orchid Bowl on Saturday and playing basketball at Santa Barbara High on Sunday. Those athletic weekends helped her blossom into a young woman with self-confidence and pride in her ability to participate. Her basketball coach really encouraged her to do her best. His support, the tournaments and bus trips, and the friendships were all a part of Camille's success in Special Olympics. The day before Camille died she wanted to call Special Olympics to find out when the basketball season started. She thought of Special Olympics as an opportunity for fun and friendship. We are very grateful that Camille had the opportunity to participate in such a worthwhile program.


Bill Shields Coach

The Goleta School District and the boys and girls who participated in the Valley Elementary League are lucky that founder Bill Shields learned to bob and weave at a young age. Bill did not have a lot of success as a Pasadena High School basketball player, so he decided he wanted to try amateur boxing. He was trained by the legendary blind boxing coach, Canto Robledo, in Robeledo's backyard gym in Pasadena. During his boxing tenure, he competed in both lightweight and welterweight division tournaments. Bill won weight division championships in 4 tournaments. What is remarkable is that he was a finalist in every boxing tournaments he entered.

Bill graduated from UCSB in 1957 and earned a Master's Degree from USC in 1962. He was hired by the Goleta School District in 1957, where he taught 6th grade at Cathedral Oaks, drove the school bus and developed a boys and girls after school athletic program. He organized the Valley Elementary League, where boys and girls teams, coached by fellow teachers

and parents, competed against one another on Saturday mornings in Goleta. Sportsmanship, fair play and citizenship were emphasized pre-, during, and post-game. The program was an overnight success. Bill's school won championships in flag football, basketball, softball; volleyball and track. After 19 years, when the Valley League was no longer needed, Bill organized and coached noon leagues at Hollister and La Patera schools. What was unique was that these teams were all co-ed.

Bill Shields coached hundreds of boys and girls in all sports. He was a truly visionary coach by promoting girls to participate in competitive sports 15 years before the implementation of Title IX. His young athletes remember his love of sport and his caring attitude toward athletes of every ability level. Bill retired from teaching in 1990 and now enjoys watching his 4 grandchildren play soccer...a game they have to explain to him!



John Gilbert Outstanding Athlete

As a child, "Lil' Johnny" would rather run than walk, never turned down a challenge and did not know what the words, "not big enough," meant. Little only describes his stature; big was his destiny. At a very young age, he displayed true athleticism. This spirit was encouraged by mentors: Bill Van Schaick and Don Yee. SBHS coaches Sam Cathcart and Mike Moropoulos cultivated John's talent. In 1960, he led the Golden Tornados to a CIF AAAA Football Championship and he received All-League honors for his 11.4 yards per carry and rushing over 1000 yards.

At SBHS in the spring of 1961, John took first place in the Compton Invitational 100 yard dash with a time of 9.6 seconds. He took first place in the Russell Cup 100 yard dash with a time of 9.7 seconds, second place in the CIF Finals 100 yard dash 9.7 seconds and a third place at the State Meet 100 yard dash at 9.7. These victories were the precursor to a very successful track career where the world was Lil' Johnny's stage.

In 1963, John was recruited to join the top athletes with the Southern California Striders Track Club. At the Amateur Athletic Union Meet in Missouri, John took second place to Bob Hayes who broke the world record in the 100 yard dash in 9.1 seconds. John ran a 9.2 This finish won him a place on the USA Dual track team. John was now a world-class athlete running in the world's finest track venues. But one of his fondest memories was not his winning in races, it was being asked by "Wilma Rudolph" to hold her seats during one of her races.

John is now a 24 year resident of Santa Maria, CA., working for ITT Industries at VAFB as a senior Computer Operator. He is a mentor in the Santa Barbara County Mentor Program. He has inspired young athletes to train hard, perfect their talents and achieve their goals. John has been married to his high school sweetheart, Pauline, for 38 years, and together they have 4 children and 11 grandchildren.




LAUREN BORETA

GREGORY QUETIN




Bob Weirum Outstanding Athlete

If you were at Peabody Stadium that Saturday morning to witness a young competitor from La Colina Jr. High School win the Santa Barbara Area Punt, Pass and Kick contest in the early 70's, you knew the champion, Bob Weirum, was destined for greatness. And it did not take Bob long to establish himself as an outstanding San Marcos interscholastic student-athlete.

During Bob's tenure at San Marcos, his leadership, tenacity and outstanding play secured him First Team All Channel League and All-CIF Football and Baseball team honors. He still holds the distinction of being the only player in Channel League history to be selected as the Most Valuable Player in both Football and Baseball. Bob's 45 yard field goal in one of the most exciting North/South county All Star Football games provided the South with a 10-7 victory.

In 1977, Bob decided to stay in Santa Barbara and play baseball at SBCC for coach Rusty Fairly, turning down several Division I scholarship offers in football and baseball. In 1978, his strong arm, golden glove and quick bat assured his selection to the Western State Conference All-League baseball team and the Western State Conference Most Valuable Player award in baseball. At the end of the 1978 season, Bob was drafted in the 8th round by the St. Louis Cardinals. He decided to place his pro baseball career on the back burner and in 1979, accepted a full baseball scholarship to Cal Poly San Luis Obispo. Here he was selected to the All District 8 First Team and All CCAA First Team as a third baseman. In 1980, Bob signed a free agent contract with the Oakland A's and was later traded to the Baltimore Orioles. Chronic arm problems ended a promising professional career.

Bob's remarkable athletic achievements established him as one of the finest athletes in Santa Barbara. Bob lives in Santa Barbara with his wife, Cyndi, and his legacy continues with the success of daughters Stacia, Kara and Alisa's as student-athletes at San Marcos.



Tracye Jean-Marie Lawyer Outstanding Athlete

Tonight you will hear about a number of student-athlete successes but few will be able to match the success Ms. Tracey Jean-Marie Lawyer has achieved at every level of athletic competition and in multiple sports. When we hear about multi-talented student-athletes, we often wonder if genetics played a role. Physiological and anatomical factors may also have contributed to her success. Certainly there was a burning desire to excel. And, you don't reach world class level without a strong character, driving determination and an exemplary work ethic. Tracey Jean-Marie Lawyer possesses all of these traits.

From enrollment in Cate School to her graduation in 1995, Tracye was involved in an interscholastic sport. Incredibly, Tracye received All CIF honors in three sports: Volleyball, Soccer and Track and Field. Tracye was selected as the Santa Barbara Athletic Round Table Track and Field Athlete of the Year in 1994 and 1995. She accepted a full athletic scholarship to attend Stanford University, and in 1997, entered her

first NCAA Heptathlon event. The rest is history. Tracye was Pac-10 Co-Player of the Year in 1998, and the Pac-10 Heptathlon champion in 1997, 1998 and 1999. In 1999, Tracye was the NCAA Heptathlon champion. She was a 5-time All-American and still holds the Stanford record in the Heptathlon with a point total of 5,855.

In 2000, Tracye was selected to participate in the US Olympic Trials. After the first day, Tracye was in second place and fighting for a place on the Olympic Team. Unfortunately she did not make the team, but she did leave a lasting impression on those who were fortunate to see her compete.

Today Tracye is still involved in Athletics, giving back to a sport she loves. She is currently coaching Track and Field at her Alma Mater, Stanford, in Palo Alto. Tracye's tremendous athleticism established her as an extraordinary student-athlete, and ultimately a Hall of Fame Inductee. Congratulations!





#### JOHN BRENNAND


When John Brennand is announced as the Master's Athlete of the Year, it will be an understatement. Because with all of his honors, he could conceivably be called the Master's Athlete of the last two decades.

During the 26 years he has been competing in this class, the 66-year old has won 11 national championships in distances from one mile to 10,000 meters (6.2 miles) in track, cross country and road running. In 1981, he set the national age-group (45-49) in the marathon in 2 hours, 28 minutes, and 46 seconds. (Keep in mind the current Olympic Trials standard is just six minutes over this.)

Please don't ask John to brag about his racing. Because he won't. In 2001, a self-described *down* year, in addition to winning the 5k (3.1 miles) national road championship, John placed 5th in the 5k and 6th in the 10k (65-69 age group) at the World Track and Field Championships in Brisbane, Australia.

The respect he has been given by other runners is not limited to his accomplishments in competition. Given nicknames like *The Godfather* and *the Dean*, John has dedicated countless hours to the local running community by race directing (founder of the 25 year old Santa Barbara Half Marathon), serving on boards (The Santa Barbara Athletic Association) and timing every local race, even the ones he enters!

# Brian Moulton Outstanding Athlete

According to Bishop Garcia Diego coaches and alumni, student-athlete Brian Moulton, a big, strong, agile, three-sport star was the best-of-the-best. In 1972, Brian was the Tri Valley League Football MVP, Baseball MVP, Santa Barbara News-Press Player of the Year in Baseball and Football and an All-CIF selection in Baseball and football.

Brian was a highly recruited student-athlete and received scholarship offers from several Division I universities in both football and baseball. Bishop Garcia Diego coach Rolf Scheel convinced Brian that the university up the road would be a *good fit*. Brian liked the idea of staying close to home and playing for UCSB coach Dave Gorrie. He accepted a full baseball scholarship from UCSB and began to rewrite the record books. Playing in the best baseball conference west of the Mississippi, Brian posted impressive wins against such powerhouses as USC, Cal, Stanford, and UCLA and went on the set a UCSB record for most pitching appearances in a career.

In 1976, Brian graduated from UCSB but was not about to bronze his glove. The San Francisco Giants drafted him in 1977. That same year, Brian was the Opening Day pitcher against the Mets in his first professional game. He hurled a one-hitter for 8 1/3 innings, striking out eleven and won the game 6-2. Brian labored for three years in the minor leagues working his way up to triple A. Brian finished his career playing for Caracas, Venezuela (AAA Inter-American League), pitching in packed stadiums in the Dominican Republic and Puerto Rico. He injured his arm and was released in 1980. Not wanting to bounce around in the minor leagues, Brian decided to return to school to pursue a career in teaching. He received his teaching credential from Chico State University in 1982.

Today, Brian and wife Angela still reside in Santa Barbara and own Moulton Painting. They have two sons, Stuart, 13 years old, and Reese, 8 years old.



#### **BOB WILLIAMS** University of California at Santa Barbara

Bob Williams earned a reputation as a program builder at UC Davis, eventually coaching the Aggies' basketball team to an NCAA Division 2 National championship in 1998. He didn't take long to make an impact at UCSB as well. Fresh off his national title, he took over a Gaucho program that had endured 5 straight losing seasons, including a 7-19 record in 1998. It took 8 straight defeats to start the 1998-99 season to turnaround, but Williams did just that, winning 15 of his last 20 games to win the Big West Conference's Western Division title and earn the league's Coach of the Year Award. That turnaround was the biggest in NCAA basketball that season.


Now 4 seasons into his career at UCSB, Williams had the Gauchos taking a step into completely new territory this spring: A Big West Conference Tournament championship. They put together a five-game winning streak at the end of last season and beat Cal Poly, UC Irvine and Utah State at the league tournament at the Anaheim Convention Center to win their first conference title in history and an automatic bid to the NCAA Tournament. It was UCSB's first NCAA berth since 1990 and its 20-10 record marked the first 20-win season since 1992. Williams also nearly shocked the college basketball world in an NCAA first-round game at Albuquerque, N.M. last March, trailing seventh-ranked Arizona by just two points with 1:44 remaining. But the Wildcats, who made 32of-42 free throws in the game, hit their foul shots the rest of the way to hold off the upstart Gauchos, 86-81. Williams now has a stellar 14-year college coaching record of 251-152 for a winning percentage of .639.

#### FRED WARRECKER Santa Barbara High School

Fred Warrecker believes in heroes. Both on the baseball field and in the classroom. Ulysses, John Kennedy and Mark McGuire have been the cornerstone of Coach Warrecker's teaching. Why heroes succeed while others fall short is his basic lesson.

As his 30th season of coaching varsity baseball at Santa Barbara High School winds to a close, Coach Warrecker reflects less on the wins and losses than on the difference he hopes he has made in the lives of his players. A recent letter from a player of a decade ago said, You taught us to respect the game, always practice hard and dream of what might be possible.

The Dons of recent years have achieved the most success: 3 consecutive Channel League Championships and, in 2000, a trip to Dodger stadium for the CIF title game. The 1975 team also won the league title and others have advanced to the playoffs.

But the true measure of Coach Warrecker's contribution to SBHS extends beyond the baseball field. He retired as a classroom teacher earlier this year, having touched the lives of thousands of students. In his Sports Literature and English classes, daily reading was mandatory, but listening and thinking were largely voluntary.

Always demanding, Coach Warrecker set a high bar for his players, his students and himself. We acknowledge his dedication and success. He has become one of our heroes.
